

Take out a Driver's Certificate

The Ontario Dept. of Highways now issues what is known as a Non-Professional Driver's Certificate of competency. It is issued to persons who wish to pass the same examination prescribed for paid drivers, and is recommended by the Dept. to all motor-car owners and drivers as a desirable Certificate to possess. In case of accident, it would serve as evidence of a driver's competency to operate a car.

H. P. McIntyre, of the Chevrolet Garage, has been appointed Chaffeur Examiner for this district for 1918. The fee for examination is only \$1.00, and the Department charges \$1 for the certificate. This is permanent and does not require to be renewed from year to year.

There is no other Dept. Examiner in this locality. Protect yourself when driving your car by owning this Certificate. There is only the small initial expense to it. No person under 16 years old is allowed to drive a car and no one under 18, unless they possess this Certificate.
