The late Dr. J. C. McGillivray

We noted some weeks ago the passing of this brilliant son of South Grey who died in Denver, Colorado. A recent Denver paper has this appreciation:

"He was a man richly endowed with those splendid principles which enshrined his character and personality in the hearts of his associates while he lived and the recollection of his pure, noble, upright, helpful life is securely locked in memory's sweet chamber never to be effaced.

He was descended from a sturdy Scotch ancestry, possessing to a marked degree those national traits of honesty and loyalty which have characterized the Scottish race.

His parents moved to Canada where he was born and grew to manhood. Passing through the local schools and colleges he graduated with honor from the Toronto Medical College and entered upon his chosen profession, in which he was eminently successful.

His genial, cheerful disposition; his bright, helpful personality; his ever-present optimism, together with his skill and medical knowledge, placed him in the front rank of the physicians and surgeons of Denver and he enjoyed a lucrative practice. For sixteen years he was one of the police surgeons of the city."

He was a prominent Odd Fellow and his brethren seem unanimous in bestowing on him the highest encomiums. The article we have quoted from ends:

"He will be missed—missed by his friends among whom he was a favorite; missed by his professional associates where he was regarded as a high-toned ethical gentleman; missed by the Odd Fellows of Denver, every one of whom loved him for his idealism of Fraternity."

Although he has set sail on that shoreless ocean from which no one has ever returned, his influence for the right, for the betterment of the human race, will live on and on forever."

The above extract was taken from the Colorado "Oddfellow" of March, and the gentleman referred to, had a host of friends and relatives in this vicinity as well as in Colorado.

Dr. McGillivray was born on Nov. 20, 1859, in Bentinck Tp. After a successful course in the public school and the Collingwood Collegiate he entered the teaching profession and for some years taught school, one term being spent in Durham as Model School Assistant.

Later he attended Medical College, Toronto, and after his course there was completed, he went to Colorado in 1889 and located in Denver where he resided until his death. He was appointed a Police Surgeon in that city and for the past sixteen years held that position.

He is survived by his widow, his father (Mr Donald McGillivray of Elmwood) and a brother and sister who all deeply mourn his loss.

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No More Titles in Canada

This question of granting old world titles on Canadian citizens has been often discussed and as often condemned. Nickle, M. P. for Kingston, had it up in the House on Monday, and Premier Borden caused some surprise by intimating that an Order in Council had been guilty passed some time ago to memorialize the British government to stop the practice. Sir Wilfrid met with hearty applause as

he announced that as far as he was concerned, if it did not imply disreputably taking his title to the market place and burn it in a bonfire. Here are the four parts in Council: 1—No honor or titular distinction, saving those granted in recognition of military service during the present war, or ordinarily bestowed by the sovereign, shall be conferred on a British subject resident in Canada except on the advice of the prime minister of Canada.

2—The British Government shall exercise the same authority as hitherto in determining the character and number of titles allocated to Canada.

3—No hereditary title shall hereafter be conferred upon a British subject resident in Canada.

The troubles in Quebec over the enforcement of the M. S. A have blown over, and parliament managed to keep its head in the discussion thereof, but no thanks to Currie M. P. of Simcoe for that. It seems to have been established that the two men chosen to round up applicants were the cause of the trouble. Sir Wilfrid Laurier declaring that one of them could be compared to Barrabas of

Jerusalem, while the other was an undesirable citizen. Sir Robt. Borden excuses his government by saying that among an unsympathetic population it is difficult to get acceptable men.

There is a rumor that Hon. C. J. Doherty Minister of Justice, is about to resign owing to unfavorable comments by members of his own party, of his administration of the M. S. A. Gen. Lessard is now in charge, a French Canadian, and it may be hoped the trouble is over.
