Mr Thos. Moore and sister, Mrs C. Petty, spent Sunday with Mr and Mrs W. Carson, Normanby.

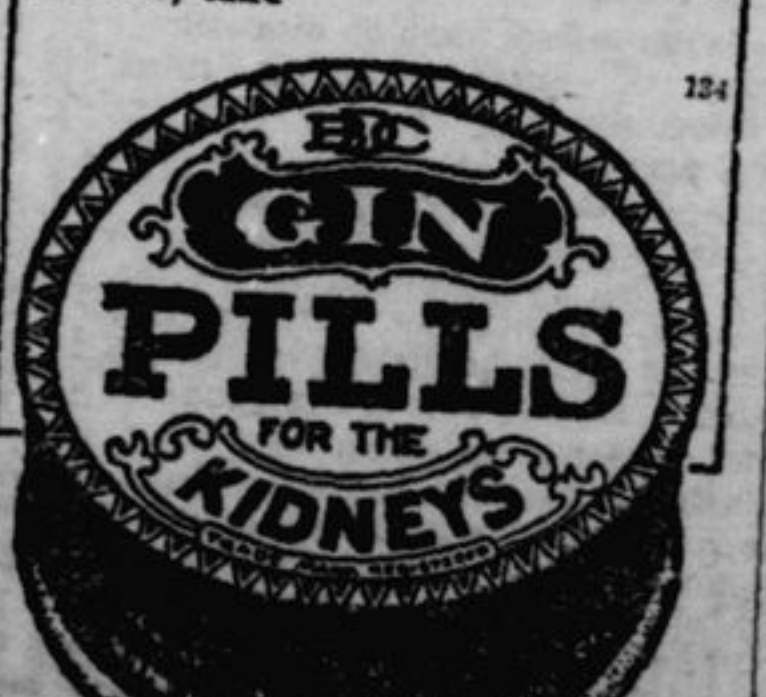
Mr W. J. Vollett is spending a few days with his sister at Allenford.

Assessment of 100 and under... 1 day
Assessment of 100 to 600... 2 days
Assessment of 600 to 1200... 3 days
Assessment of 1200 to 1800... 4 days
Assessment of 1800 to 2600... 5 days
Assessment of 2600 to 3400... 6 days
and for every \$700 or fraction thereof thereafter be added one day.

McDonald—Hunt—That By-law be read, signed and sealed. Carried.

McDonald—Hewitson—That road division of Mr Jaeklin be same as in former years and they do work on S L 20, Con. 1, S. D. R. Carried.

Hunt—Hewitson—That this council appoint a delegate to wait upon the Minister of Militia and Defence and the Dominion Government asking that they reconsider the order in-council cancelling the exemption of farmers' sons that by so doing they seriously cripple the food production and in our opinion is detrimental to winning the war, seeing that inexperienced help from towns and cities is unsatisfactory to farmers. Carried.

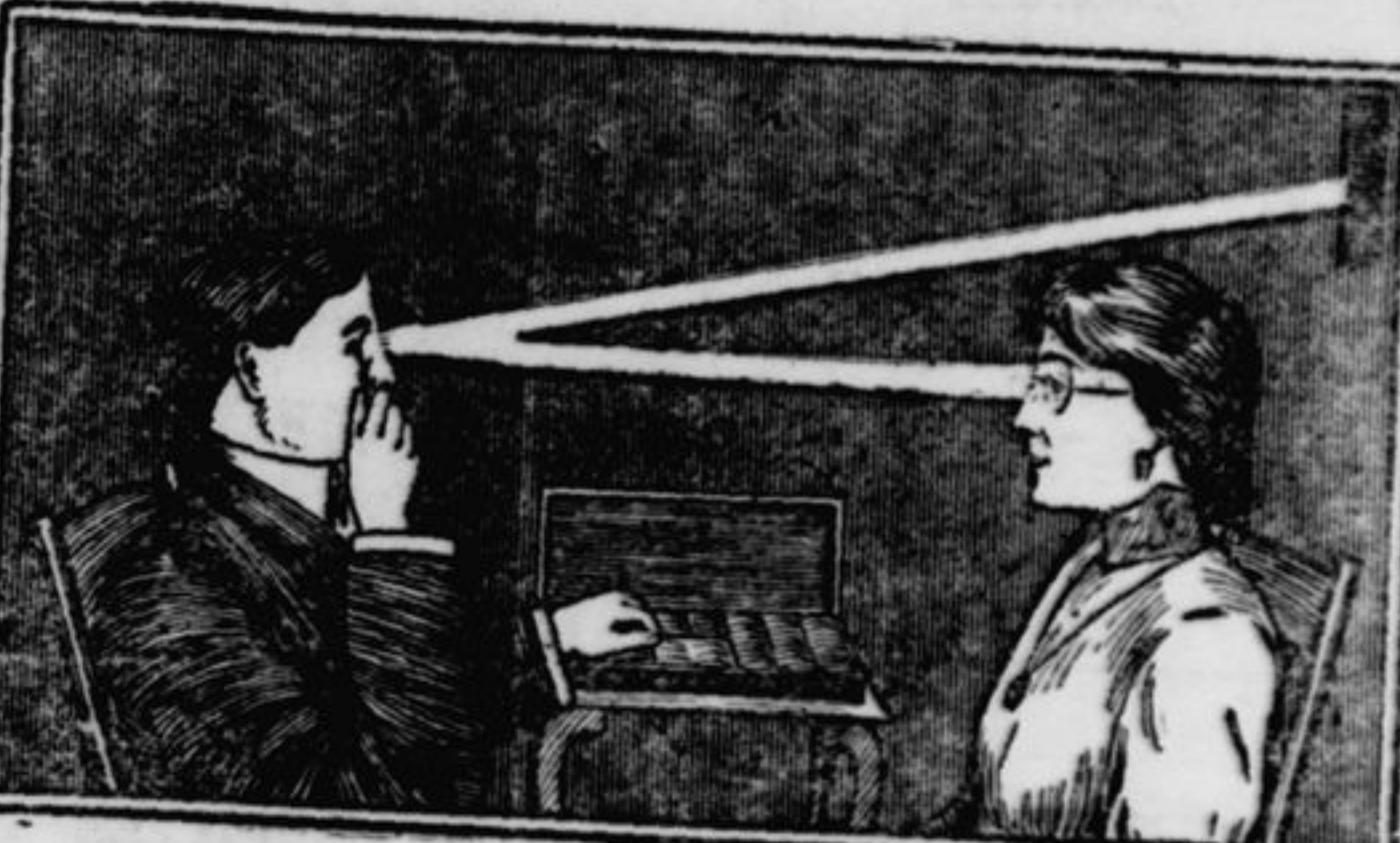
