### FALL WHEAT SEED ANNOUNCEMENT

In view of the partial failure of the Fall wheat crop in this Province this year, it will be necessary for farmers to make early arrangements for the supply of seed which they will need for fall sowing. Under those circumstances farmers who have on hand quantities of wheat suitable for fall seeding are urged to conserve them for this purpose. If there is no demand locally, the information should be supplied to this Department or to the Local Office of this Department in your County so that every effort may be made to have an equitable and satisfactory distribution. The need for foodstuffs justifies a large acreage of Fall Wheat in this Province again this year, and the co-operation of the farmers in the mobilization and distribution of the available seed supplies is invited.
