Death of Mrs Donald Ferguson. It is our sad duty to record the death of Mrs Donald Ferguson, who died at her home on the 17th con. of Proton on June 24th, aged 73 years. For several months she suffered from rheumatism and about a month ago, unfortunately fell and fractured a bone in her leg, which again confined her to her bed. But this affliction was borne, as her other ailments had been, with the utmost patience, while her usual cheerfulness of manner never deserted her; her chief thought being then, as always, the comfort and welfare of others. The friends who visited her, and they were many, will always remember her patience and Christian resignation to what she felt was God's will.

Her life in the community was a force for good. She was a friend alike to the rich and the poor, the young and the old. No one ever entered her home unwelcomed, nor left it hungry, and while her loss will be most keenly felt in the home which she loved, to many others her death is a personal loss. She lived worthily and her memory will be long cherished. She was born in Ayrshire Scotland, in 1845, her maiden name being Ann Black, and although she came with her parents to Canada when ten years old, she could recall and relate many interesting facts of Scottish life. She was well read and had a remarkable memory, thus making social intercourse with her a source of pleasure and information.

The immediate friends who mourn her loss are her husband, whom she married forty-six years ago, and four children, Rachel (Mrs Geo. W. Par-slow), George, Christina and Marion. The eldest child Etta, died in childhood. Two granddaughters, Misses Elida and Ivy Parslow, and a sister, Mrs Jean Campbell, also mourn, and these have the sincere sympathy of the entire community, particularly tender towards the only son George, who is at present undergoing treatment at Wellesley Hospital, Toronto. The only sad consolation available to him was that of sending a large wreath of beautiful flowers. The thoughts of mourners and friends were with him during those sad days and many were the wishes expressed that he would soon be completely restored to health and home, where his presence, and that of his sister, Christina, who returned to Toronto to be with him, will cheer and comfort father and sisters. A beautiful floral tribute was also sent by Mr George Heard of Toronto, who from infancy to early manhood was a near neighbor of Mrs Ferguson.

Interment took place on Wednesday afternoon at Salem cemetery, Salem being the church home of the deceased. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. A. Matheson, who spoke fitting words of comfort and consolation.
