Melnis—Peart—That the Assistant Provincial Secretary's suggestions re amendment of the Assessment Act be approved and that this Council recommend that the Townships be assessed only every 5th year.

Melnis—Black—That the claim of S. S. No. 4, Glenelg, this Council is of the opinion that they are legally entitled same resolve that the Assessor be instructed to assess Lots 2, 3 and 4, con. 15, and Lots 3 and 4, con. 14, as ratepayers to said School Section, No. 4. Carried.

Black—Peart—That fees for sheep inspectors be \$1.50 for inspecting, valuing, and certificate for sheep killed by dogs. Carried.

Tarnbull—Black—That a further appropriation of \$75.00 be made for each Ward. Carried.

Tarnbull—Peart—That the Assessment Roll as revised by the Court of Revision on June 8th and passed over to this Council be the Assessment Roll for this Township of Glenelg for the year 1918. Carried.

It Can be Utilized for Food for the Hogs.

MILK IN THE WARM WEATHER

Proper Care of Dairy Products in the Summer Time—Threshing Gangs Will Help to Relieve Farm Labor Shortage—Work Is to Be Initiated This Year.

THE pen is mightier than the sword—especially when it has a pig in it. Then multiply that pig by 40,000. Multiply this again by 200 lbs., and an imposing total of 8,000,000 lbs. is reached—more pounds of pork, indeed, than were exported by Canada shortly before the war.

This is the evidence given by a commission appointed by the Agricultural Section of the Ontario Organization of Resources Committee, to investigate the feeding of garbage to swine.

The salient points of the report which has been prepared regarding their findings are briefly: (1) That garbage has a food value of between \$8 and \$9 a ton; (2) that it should be fed entirely to hogs, washed or sorted; (3) that residents of towns and cities where garbage is to be fed, must separate their garbage, placing table refuse only in a separate container.
