Among these may be mentioned: Placing the milk at once on delivery in a refrigerator or cool cellar protected from dust and odors, and by keeping it in the milk bottle covered with an inverted glass tumbier, or special cov-Miss Watson, Owen Sound, is visit- er; the top of the milk-cap should be wiped to remove dust before taking it from the milk bottle; no more milk should be taken from the supply bottle than is required for a meai; any "left over" milk, should not be put into the supply vessel after the meal, as this will likely spoil the whole of the milk on hand; milk taken to a sick-room should not be used for any other purpose, except it be boiled and then only for cooking; milk botties should be washed as soon as empty and be promptly returned to the milkman-in no case should milk bottles be used for any other purpose in the house than for holding milk .-Prof. H.
