Harvest Hands in Urgent Demand to save Wes. Wheat Crop

Mr R. L. Fairbairn, Gen. Passenger Agent, Can. Northern Ry., Toronto, states that as a result of a conference between their representatives and representatives of the Dominion and Provincial Gov'ts at Winnipeg, it has been decided that at least 20,000 harvesters will be required over and above the local supply of help available to garner the western wheat crop this year.

An appeal must be made to the east and this help should be timed to reach Winnipeg for distribution to needy points west, from Aug. 20th to Sept 10th. It is understood that Harvesters' wages this year will be from \$3.50 to \$4 per day with board for about 3 months' work.
