Points to be Remembered

The war has cost Canada one billion dollars.

The war is not yet ended.

Even if the fighting does end in the near future, the military expenditure will remain high until the soldiers are demobilized.

425,000 Canadians have gone overseas and Lord Shaughnessy says that it will probably take 18 months to bring them back.

If the war were to end to-morrow it would probably cost \$250,000,000 to demobilize the Canadian soldiers.

For Canada's Expeditionary Force Pay and Allowances alone amount to \$14,000,000 a month: whether the men are fighting or not.

Of the \$500,000,000 desired through the Victory Loan, this year's war bill will be equal to four-fifths of it.

Bear in mind that a large portion of the money received through the Victory Loan will go to finance sales of Canada's products to Britain.
