DISASTROUS BLAZE IN HOLSTEIN ON WEDNESDAY EVENING

Nicholson's Mill and Handle Factory Burned to the Ground. Fire Prevented from Spreading.—Cause Unknown.

About 8 p. m. on Wednesday evening smoke was seen issuing from the handle factory and the fire made such quick headway, that chopping mill and factory, all under the one roof, were doomed and citizens had the mortification of witnessing the destruction of Holstein's two chief industries. The corrugated roof kept the flames to some extent within control and aided the workers in saving lumber piles near by, and adjacent buildings. The flames rapidly worked to the front of the mill and so intense was the heat that the plate glass window of Arnill's store across the road, was cracked. Fortunately there was little wind, and the sparks arising from the flames did no further damage, though Nicholson's residence once caught fire. This Thursday morning the fire is still burning in the basement among fallen timbers, grain, etc.

The fire is believed originated in the engine room, in the old drying kiln. A new dry kiln had just been erected by the owners, Messrs Buller and Brebner and other improvements made, including the installation of hydro power, when this check came to their enterprise. Mr L. E. Nicholson also sustains a heavy loss in the chopping mill, where a large stock of grain, flour, feed, etc, is destroyed. The total loss must be up in the thousands, and is understood partially covered by insurance.

Had there been a strong wind, or in another direction, a much larger conflagration might have ensued. As it was, the fire was visible in Durham and for many miles in all directions. A large crowd from the surrounding country, with some from Mt. Forest and Durham as well, were soon on the scene.
