Bring Soldiers Home As Soldiers

We are heartily in sympathy with the Toronto Star in its condemnation of the proposal to bring men home in classes of workmen, such as railway men, farmers, etc., and not as soldiers.

Not only should they come home as soldiers, they should as far as possible come home in local groups, disembark at the station that saw them go, and march through our streets with the swing of the victory they have helped to achieve.

Sink Battleships?

The proposal has been seriously made by some badly-balanced brain that to avoid jealousy of the allied powers over the allotment among them of the surrendered ships of the German navy, they be sunk!

Gen. Currie Speaks

Gen. Currie, Canadian Commander has issued a remarkable order to Canadian troops warning them to be on guard while in German surroundings, and to maintain strictest discipline, so as not to lose the good name their many victories have brought them.

The order in its every line marks him as a true gentleman as he has been a true soldier, and we make space for its closing paragraph:

"Rest assured that the crimes of Germany will receive adequate punishment. Attempts will be made by insidious propaganda to undermine the source of your strength but you, the soldier citizens of the finest and most advanced democracy in the world, will treat such attempts with the contempt they deserve.

North Huron Goes Liberal

The three-cornered contest in North Huron on Monday resulted in a victory for the Liberal candidate, Mr. W. Fraser by a plurality of 1203. The result was expected as his opponents were both conservative.

Dr. Case was the government nominee and H. B. Spouton, Independent Conservative and their combined vote was very little higher than Fraser's, only 139.

Fraser held no meetings, had no support from the Liberal organization, or even from Liberal leader, Broadfoot. He is Reeve of Morris township, a farmer, and depended on the farmers and they did not fail him.

Case was a poor speaker, Spouton a good one, yet he stood lowest of all. This is the fourth bye-election lost by the Hearst government, the others being N. W. Toronto, N. Perth and Manitoulin. However Premier Hearst has still an ample margin of supporters, though the tide plainly flows against him.

The vast sum of \$16,000,000 is to be spent soon for the completion of the new Welland canal. The Minister of Public Works expects that soon 4000 men will get employment.

The puzzle of "How to catch the Kaiser" is still being discussed and rehearsed in Britain and France, but so far has not developed any expert that can find the solution. Meanwhile the ex-Kaiser has been discovered leading encouragement to a plot to restore him to the throne of Prussia at least. At the head of this plot is Gen. Mackensen and some other generals, but Eidenburg had refused to join the plotters. The sooner the arch-criminal is out of Holland and under the control of the Allies, the better.

Farmers Take Action

A Tariff and Taxation Policy of a Sweeping Character Demanded

The Canadian Council of Agriculture meeting in Winnipeg last week, have made their pronouncement on a New National Policy for Canada. This is embodied in the eight propositions appearing below.

The changes asked for are of a sweeping nature, and will not meet with favor from the mysterious class known as the "Big Interests". It is interesting to note that one of the items demands the acceptance of the reciprocity agreement of 1911 on which was fought in Ontario at least, the election of that year, and in support of which the Laurier government went down to defeat.

Here are the items taken from last Saturday's Globe:

Immediate and substantial all-round reduction of the customs tariff. Reduction of customs duty on goods imported from Britain to one half of rates charged under the general tariff.

Acceptance of the reciprocity agreement of 1911, and the placing of all foodstuffs not included in said agreement on the free list.

Agricultural implements, farm machinery, vehicles, fertilizers, coal, lumber, cement, illuminating fuel and lubricating oils to be placed on the free list.

All tariff concessions granted to other countries to be immediately extended to Britain.

All corporations manufacturing products protected by tariff to be required to publish accurate statements of their earnings.

Every claim for tariff protection to be heard publicly by special Parliamentary Committee.

The resulting reduction in revenue to be met by direct taxation on unimproved land values, graduated income and inheritance taxation, a graduated tax on corporate profits and by basing the levying and collecting of the business profits tax upon the actual cash invested.

A People Past Shame

We have now no trust whatever in the Germans generally or, strange to say, in a single individual German. The names of statesmen keep constantly changing, but they are one to us. They all have behind them infamous pasts. They are all, so far as appears, tarred with the same brush. There may be among the people several thousand who have not bowed the knee to Baal. If there are they are silent. What we see, what we have learned about the Germans during the war, is that they are a people to whom truth, honor, common decency do not speak of merely, are things to be jeered at. They are happily not past suffering, but they are past shame. Their cruelty is to cruelty of demons. While they prattle about peace they are busy, as President Wilson says, in the worst and basest kind of atrocities. Whether there ever will be any mitigating circumstances, whether there may be a change of heart in Germany, we do not know. There must come repentance first, and while no doubt the Germans are sorry for the plight in which they find themselves, and their kaiser in particular must have his own thoughts on his future, they keep on maintaining that what they did was right, that they fought in self-defense, and that for their endless atrocities no apology of any kind is necessary. We fancy that for the present generation at least we must accept the judgment: "Wolf he is and wolf he will remain."

Saugeen Red Cross Meeting

The Saugeen Red Cross Workers met at the home of Mrs. Jas. Ellison on Nov. 16th. 2 day shirts, 2 suits pyjamas were made and some children's clothes. The collection amounted to \$3.70. The next meeting will be held at Mrs. Wm. Kenny's on Dec. 9 when 2 boxes are to be filled for overseas.

In the last year this Society has made 39 hospital robes, 8 surgical robes, 35 day shirts, 14 suits pyjamas, 39 pillow cases, 310 towels and 138 handkerchiefs were hemmed. 169 personal property bags, 30 prs of bed socks and 24 face cloths were made. 32 prs of socks knit 7 boxes filled for overseas and 4 quilts donated. The collection has been \$137.50 and 6 feet of copper. An autograph quilt, which brought \$36.00 and was sold for \$20.00. The proceeds of which the society are using to buy yarn to knit socks for the boys overseas.
