### A Peace Christmas

Next Sunday in all the churches there will be such a grateful thankful, outpouring of the Christmas spirit as has not been seen for four years past, indeed we may say has never been seen, for never in the world's history for nineteen hundred years has a victory so fraught with important consequences, been so gloriously won as that which culminated on the 11th and 21st of November last.

One shudders to think, in view of German brutalities, hymns of hate and inhuman practices by sea and land, what would have been the character of this Christmas had victory been won by the Hun and his allies.

If ever there was a time to show gratitude to God for mercies and blessings it is at this Christmas season, and in no way can it be better shown than by a devout attendance in the House of God on God's holy day.

### The U. F. O. Meeting

The great Provincial meeting of the United Farmers of Ontario in session this week in Toronto. And some session it is. Representatives from all parts of the Province are in attendance and attention is given to matters ranging from the raising of the capitation tax, from \$6 to \$1, to the highest place of legislation in their interest; and there is evidence of a general belief in Pres. Halbert's dictum that "the business of the Convention is the business of Ontario and the Dominion of Canada."

The Constitution has been amended to admit ladies, so they are no longer in equal rights and it was done unanimously.

There are strong, even bitter words being said against profiteers and plutocrats, but, says Halbert, the day is near when even such persons "will have to get off and walk." Secy Morrison said that from the great Ottawa convention had sprung "The Farmers' Publishing Co. Ltd." capitalized at \$500,000 and a bright future seems assured for the venture. The co-operative features of the Association have been very successful a turn over of over a million and a half showing tremendous progress since 1914.

Norman Lambert Secy of the Canadian Council of Agriculture, strongly advocated reduction of the tariff and direct taxation. Farmers were willing that there should be a tax on land values as well as on incomes and business profits.

The Executive Committee consists of one Director from each County who from among themselves elect Vice President and Secy Treas.

The income for the year was almost \$13000 and the expenditure \$6227.00.

The U. F. O. will become—is now—a strong institution.

Friday evening last the home of Mr. Thos. McAllister, 3rd Con., Normanby, was invaded by neighbors from miles around, their object being to welcome as a community a son of the home, Pte. Walter McAllister, returned from overseas and gory trenches. The night was wet and dreary, but that didn't deter the assembling of a crowded houseful, who entered in the spirit of the occasion with great heartiness. Mr Albert Marshall was made chairman and an impromptu program of music and song was carried out, Mr R. Watt on the violin being a host in himself.

At an appropriate time the young soldier was brought to his feet to face the following address, which explains itself. The secret of the meeting had been well kept, and though such a surprise is embarrassing, the recipient made a suitable reply, the chief point of which was that though glad to be home he would if necessary take up arms again in defence of Canada. The address is as follows:

Dec. 13th, 1918.  
To Pte. Walter W. McAllister,  
Durham.

Dear Walter,— We, your friends and schoolmates have met together here in your home this evening with feelings of joy and thankfulness to bid you a most welcome return into our midst and associate with you for a few hours.

As we think back over our school days together, we can vividly recall occasions when by your uprightness and manliness you have won our respect and approval; and in our sports you always showed fair play and exhibited a sacrificial spirit.

When the call came for the boys to don the khaki, we can readily understand, how willingly and fearlessly you left all behind and went forward to fight our common foe, ready to sacrifice even your own precious young life for home and country.

You have gone forward, a real true soldier and have seen army life in every phase and no doubt have found that it was by no means all sunshine. You have seen your comrades and loved ones fall in battle and our hearts are sorely rent with the thoughts of the vacant chair this cruel war has caused in your home. To you and your home folk we extend our sympathy in this sacrifice, which your dear soldier boy has made.

We would feel for you, Walter, in your being wounded but may the kind Providence, who has guided and cared for you through so far, restore to you your health and strength and ever bless you on your pathway through life.

We appreciate the stand you took in our behalf and we ask you to accept this petty gift, as a mere expression of our thankfulness and token of our delight in having you in our midst once more.

Along with this we ask you to accept from us our every good wish to you at this Christmas season and may this Christmas be more joyous than ever before.

### Cadet Box Social

The Cadet Corps have not as yet appeared to the town or there would have been a larger attendance on Tuesday evening at their unique performance. However the hall was about three fourths full with an appreciative audience and admissions and sale of boxes easily netted them over \$100 which is to be applied to the purchase of uniforms.

Mr. A. S. Merton, Principal of the Public School, is the efficient instructor of the Cadets, now 35 to 40 strong. They were organized about 16 months ago, and being part of our educational system, are subject to government inspection and small grants are given on the merit displayed. They are trained in precision of movement, correct physical attitude and habits and this is attained by drills of various kinds, marches, etc. They have also a limited amount of target practice, but so far have only had two rifles, but now that war is over are promised soon a rifle for each cadet. They hold meetings every Friday evening in the old Library building.

The program presented, Mr C. Ramage being in the chair, was an interesting one. Exhibitions of Rifle and Sword drills by 16 boys was well carried out, especially the former and, in the closing number all the cadets, were put through "four's" wheeling, etc. in military style. The atmosphere of the work is decidedly military, and it may be hoped the training given may never in their lives be supplemented by actual military operations. Miss N. Lowe of the Public school staff made an excellent accompanist to the movement exercises and with Mr. Robt Isaac on violin gave two instrumental pieces which were deservedly encored. A cadet orchestra on grotesque lines, caused much amusement.
