The Clerk reported that the report, assessments, plan and profile on Municipal Drain No 1, Eg't & Proton had been received from the engineer and duly filed on Dec 2nd, and all the parties who had been assessed thereon had been properly notified of the amount of their assessments and that the report would be read at this meeting of Council. The clerk read said report, assessments and estimates and proposed plan and profile for examination. Hunter-Ferguson-That report of engineer be adopted and Clerk be instructed to prepare necessary by-law for construction and providing of funds for said drain to be introduced and passed provisionally at next meeting of Council. Carried. Com'r Hunter reported Alex Ross, rep of culvert \$3; Geo Schenk, cutting brush \$2.50; Jos Rawl, repair of culvert \$2.10; Jos Dowling, boner wire fence \$13.50; Jas Hamilton, wire of winter road \$3; Erwin Robb removing stones 50c; E. McInnes repair of bridge \$90; J Brown G A 18, bonus wire fence \$14.40; do, repair of culvert \$2.60; Victor Adams bonus wire fence \$24.75; Geo. Dyce, gravelling Eg't and Proton townline \$48.40; do, gravel \$5.64; Eg't & Proton townline, W. J. Philp, gravelling days labor \$20; C. McInnes gravel 72c; Wm Hay, repair sidewalk, Dromore, \$4.80; Neil Calder, gravel \$7.68; do, removing stones \$2, services as com \$5. Com'r Brown reported W J Wilson, cleaning out ditch \$2; W J McFadden cleaning off brush and timber for the wood; Jno Hill, cutting brush \$5; services as com'r \$2. Com'r McDougall reported Thos. Yake filling in washout \$1; H. L. Nicholson, winter work on roads, 1.80; A Fraser, \$1.40; Thos Norris, do, 1.50; Wm Patterson, do, 2.40; Geo Swanson, do, \$1.25. Hunter-Brown-That in reference to the communication from W. B. Volter, clerk, Durham, extending an invitation to the Council to attend a public meeting in Durham on 17th inst to consider some way to erect a memorial to our boys who have paid the supreme sacrifice in the war just ended, that our Reeve represent this Council at said meeting. Carried. A by-law was passed to provide a place to receive nominations for Muni Council for 1919 and to appoint D. R. O. and Poll Clerks. The following were appointed Deputy Returning Officers and Poll Clerks respectively; Div. No 1, John Brown and Lorne Allan; No. 2, Wm Leith and Gordon Giddes; No 3, Wm H. Rogers and Wm Coburn; No 4, Chas Melones and Jno Sinclair; No 5, Jas McLaughlin and Wm Walker; No 6, Peter Keith and John Wilkie. Polling places the same as former years. Hunter-Brown-That an order be drawn on the treasurer to the amt of \$5 in favor of D. R. Beaton, Clerk Tp. of Pickering for contribution to the funds of the Rural Municipal Association of Ontario. Ferguson-Hunter-That Matthew Barber be refunded \$7.48 taxes on account of loss of barn by fire. Carried. Brown-Ferguson-That Joseph Moore be refunded \$2 dog tax, error in assessment. Carried. The annual report of the M. O. H. was read as follows; To the Chairman and the Members of the Bd of Health for Egremont Township, Gentlemen, As medical officer of Health for Egremont Tp. for the year 1918, I beg to report as follows; the township has been almost entirely free from contagious or epidemic disease during the year except for the recent influenza epidemic. There were a number of quite severe cases of this disease and two deaths from pneumonia following the influenza. No cases of diphtheria have been reported during the year, no cases of scarlet fever, typhoid, measles or mumps. A few cases of whooping cough were reported in the south of the township and a few in the north east corner. There have been no cases of tuberculosis reported so that with the exception of the influenza epidemic we have almost a clean bill of health for the year. I remain, Yours, T. H. Sneath, M. O. H. D. salary & postage \$41; W Reeves, conveying P. McCanby to H. of Refuge and expenses \$10.05; T. P. of Pickering for contribution to E Henry, sheep killed \$27; W Wilson, do \$15; Jno. McPhee, do \$26; A McDougall inspecting sheep \$0c; S Patterson, do \$2; Councillors' pay sheet \$2; Jno McGrath, use of Council room \$2. Carried. Hunter-Brown-That the Reeve vacate the chair and Councillor Ferguson occupy the same. That the thanks of this Council be tendered to Mr McArthur for his kind and courteous manner towards this Council during the year and for his efficient and impartial manner in discharging his duties as Reeve and also the same to Clerk and Treasurer.
