A Little War Story

The following story of a remarkable co. incidence in connection with the great war is from The Bruce Herald and Times Walkerton: Capt. Roy Whitehead of the broken up

While in England he was given a letter of introduction to a prominent farmer in Wales. While visit ing this farmer he noticed a German soldier prisoner in his employ. In reply to his query regarding the faithfulness of the soldier, the farmer gave him a splendid recommendation and told Capt. Whitehead the following remarkable story which shows that facts are sometimes strange as fiction. The young German soldier wrote a letter to his parents in Germany telling them how well he was used by a Welsh farmer, and suggested that if they had any British prisoners working for them, that they should use them well. In due time a letter was received that a British prisoner was working for them, and that he was the son of the farmer who was employing their son in Wales Reads like a fairy tale, but nevertheless it's true.
