Durham Presbyterians

Have Buoyant Annual Meeting \$150 Increase for Pastor

With all departments of church work in a progressive state financially the Annual Congregational Meeting of Durham Presbyterian Church held last Monday passed into history as one of the most harmonious and successful in all its sixty three years of history.

For three years in succession the summary of contributions for all purposes has been greater than its predecessors each year being the largest ever up to that time.

Perhaps the chief feature of the year has been the Missionary activity. The pastor appealed for increased liberality to the extent of \$500. This was secured in one day and in a short time was exceeded by \$300.

The Ladies' Aid Society had its banner year also with an expenditure on Red Cross Benevolence of \$1200. This society has shipped in the war some 22000 articles of war comforts, made at their weekly meetings.

Enquiry was made as to the date of introduction of new hymn book. There is a feeling in some quarters, that in view of possible union with other churches, a new hymn book at this juncture was a mistake.

Messrs Jno Morrison, Dr. J. F. Grant, Robt McFadden, Dr. D. B. Jamieson were elected managers. Mr. T. G. Lauder was afterward elected chairman of the Board.

Mr Calder was made chairman of the committee, Mr Thos. Allan, Secy. Treas. The committee is composed of the ministers of the town, two members from the Patriotic League, A. H. Jackson and J. P. Telford, Mrs. Gilbert McKechnie and Miss J. Weir, from the I. O. D. E., the Mayor and Reeve from the Council; Miss Laura McKenzie and Mrs Kelly from the Red Cross Society and Mrs Geo. McKechnie and Miss M. Hunter from the Ladies' Aid of the Pres. Church, Jas Lloyd and Ed. McClocklin from the Anglican church; T. McComb and Allan Bell from the Baptist Ch., R. E. Richardson and H. McCrae from the Methodist church, H. J. Sneek and C. Ramage from Pres Ch.; F. Lenahan and M. McGrath from the R. C. Church.

That something else is likely to be a club bag to each of the boys, the financing to be done by private subscription, and, hitting the nail on the head, lists were opened at once and in a few minutes in gifts of 20, 15, 10 and 5 dollars and smaller sums, \$400 was subscribed and much of it paid in.

We trust the collectors will meet with a generous support from citizens who were not present.
