**"Joe" Boyle Becomes Duke of Jassy**

That truth is stranger than fiction is shown by some extracts from various papers that have been shown us relating to Joe Boyle, a cousin of Mrs Jno Cottie Bentinck, and a relative to the Boyle family of that township, though this

Joseph was born in Toronto and educated in Woodstock.

This Joseph like his bible namesake, was a man of some push, distinguished himself at school and College and playground, entered the Klondike in the gold-rush days and was extremely fortunate in the pursuit of the shining metal, and in securing and handling timber reserves. Then the war called him, and the money he had begun to flow out in organizing war units, supplying machine guns, etc.

He went to England in August 1916, and got the notice of the imperial authorities, who put him on an Advisory Board dealing with Russian railways. Just as he arrived at Tirograd, he was asked to help solve the food supply problem, then pressing hard. He was not heard of again in March 1918 when he turns up in Southern Russia. Then came by way of Paris news that 'Col. Joseph Boyle a Canadian officer from the Yukon had become a popular hero in Rumania and had been awarded the highest Rumanian decoration, the golden Crown, by the King for saving some exiles from death by the Russian Bolsheviks.' Later he was given the title Duke of Jassy, as a final honor. Then there's a Lady Boyle, or Duchess of Jassy, or 'Joe Boyle's wife' as Yukonites would call her, and there's a son able to look after his father's Yukon interests, and a daughter who won the 100 meter swimming record for America at Los Angeles in open competition inheriting her father's love of sport. That's record enough for one man, surely.

**"The New Minister"**

The Ladies' Aid Society of the Methodist church scored a distinct success in their opera, "The New Minister" in the Town Hall on Thursday night last. The hall was filled to its utmost capacity and we feel safe in saying that all were completely satisfied.

There is a large caste in the opera and covers all branches and agencies of the church from the new minister down to the sexton. The play opens with a choir rehearsal and Prof. Topnote (Mr. R.
