How Star Men Cover World News Events

When the Titanic was sunk, The Toronto Daily Star rushed seven members of the staff to New York to "cover" the story. When Ulster threatened rebellion, three Star men travelled 4,000 miles to get the facts. When the Halifax explosion occurred, a small army of photographers and writers went to get the story.
