Seaford, Sussex, England, Dec. 18th, 1918

Dear Mr and Mrs Philp, - Received your letter on Sunday, signed on behalf of the Patriotic Society of Holstein.

I wish to say that the Patriotic Society should not have sent me such a note of appreciation for my services in the army. I have not done anything for my king and country.

It is the boys who were volunteers and came overseas and fought in France who deserve credit. My dear mother and father have suffered more during my absence from them than I have. They have worried very much about me while I have had a good time and have seen lots of sights I would never have if not having been in the army.

I have had my leave and had a dandy time. I was in London, Selby, Glasgow, Edinburgh, Aberdeen, Dundee, Lancaster and Liverpool. I think I could give a lecture on my experience since coming to England, but will tell you all about it when I get home. In London I saw the King's Horse, stables and harness, also his six royal carriages and they sure are some buggies.

I was in Westminster Abbey and saw where all the great statesmen were buried and is a very solemn place. I saw where the kings and queens have been crowned, also where they hold parliament. I was in London Tower and also in St. Paul's Cathedral. It is a wonderful building.

Well I must close now wishing you a merry Christmas and a bright and prosperous New Year. We are to have turkey for Xmas dinner and supper and ham and eggs for breakfast.

I close now hoping to see you before next Xmas. I have not heard from Charlie as yet but think he must left for Canada as I have not heard from
