Reception for Pte H McDonald

The doors of the hospitable home of Mr. Wm McLeod were opened wide on Tuesday night, Feb. 18th, to the large gathering of friends who met to welcome home Pte Hector H. McDonald of the 198th Canadian Buffs.

The happy tenor of the merry-makers, expressed more than words, their gratitude in having another of our soldiers return home safe and sound, after giving of his best service toward the achievement of such grand and glorious victory as they have won for us.

After spending the earlier part of the evening in dancing, Mr Peter McArthur was voted to the chair, which office he filled with his usual ability. Mr McArthur announced that the crowd had assembled for a double purpose, first to celebrate Mr and Mrs McLeod's sixteenth wedding anniversary and second to welcome home Pte Hector McDonald. The latter part of the program was a complete surprise to Hector who had come with only the former intention in view.

On being presented with the address which appeared below and a purse, Hector very appropriately replied expressing his complete surprise and thanking all for their kindness and consideration for him. He also wished to thank very heartily the different Red Cross Societies of this part, Priceville, Ebenezer, Bunesan and Glenelg Centre, also, individuals who so kindly and generously remembered him with boxes while he was overseas.

Short and appropriate speeches were made by Messrs Jno Weir, W. McLeod, Arch. McCuaig, Thos Nichol, John A. McDonald, A. B. McArthur, Malcolm McLenis and Neil MacMillan. A solo was given by Mrs Wm. Mather and the programme closed with the National Anthem.

We, your friends and associates of this vicinity and surrounding community are here assembled on this joyous occasion to welcome you and rejoice with your aged father and the rest of the family, on such a reunion.

This you have attained to a very marked degree in civilian life as well as a soldier of our King and Country. You have run hazardous risks in this heinous warfare of the Huns, battling for a good and noble cause, that we might still enjoy that freedom liberty and righteousness that has tended to make our Empire the banner one of this great world.

We thank God for the restoration of Peace and pray that wars may cease to be no more; that Prussianism may pass into oblivion and that harmony may exist over the length and breadth of the whole world through the countless ages of eternity.

Death of Adam Brown Sr.

Mr Browns death ends the last original male pioneer of Holstein and he is the last original founder of the Holstein Agricultural Society. He it was who wrote the notices calling the first meeting now over 50 years ago. His interest in the place never faded and though not a continuous resident, its progress was ever gratifying to him.

Deceased was a man of more than average intelligence, a student of current events to the last. He was Liberal in politics, a faithful member of the Presbyterian church and in health his pew was seldom vacant. He was something of a naturalist also, and the writer treasures memories of an intimacy that began only late in life but will be abiding. He had in him also a poetical spirit, and a marked ability in rhyming and a fair and touching sample of this is appended to this article, lines written to his wife on the last anniversary of his wedding day. He has passed on before her, he had on the whole a beautiful old age and was a fine example of

"A life well lived, a fight well fought, True heart and equal mind."

Here are the verses referred to; can one imagine a more exquisite valentine tribute than this after 57 years of wedded life?

"To Mother

And I look on her face, changed, though lovely to me,
And I look at our sand glass, and there too I see
Those sands quickly passing, oh which will it be
That receives the first shaft from Death's quiver?
I hope that the Master may first call me
For then I could linger along by the shore
Until that you join me to part never more
And I'd help you my love o'er the river"
