THE DURHAM REVIEW

Impressions of Toronto (By our Priceville Correspondent) Parliament Bld'gs, Toronto. Mr Editor: We promised to send some kind of a budget from this busy city to the Review and to comply with our promise we try and collect some matter or another for to get a decent looking appearance in this week's Review.

This is Saturday afternoon the 1st of March and by coolness of the breath of the west wind in this southern city, we came to the conclusion that between Durham and Priceville fur coats and caps would be essential while on the highway from those two towns of our northern county.
