AIRMEN HELPED GEN. ALLENBY Capt. Alan Bott of R. A. F. Tells of Palestine Campaign.

Captain Alan Bott of the Royal Air Forces recently arrived in New York from Palestine and Syria, where he served with Gen. Allenby's army in its march through the Holy Land and its fight against the Turkish army led by German officers.

He was shot down and captured to Constantinople. He escaped in disguise and reached a port in Russia which he found in control of the Germans and the Bolsheviki, and finally got away to Bulgaria. Previous to his adventures in the near Captain Bott, who is twenty-six years of age, flew for two years along the Western front and was shot down during one of the battles of the Somme, but escaped capture.

Speaking of the Palestine campaign, Capt. Bott said:-

"The Turks are good at fighting on the ground, but they could not fly. and their airplanes were all manned by Germans or Austrians. Our job was to make flights across to Nazareth, Nablous-which was ancient Sechem-and other points held by the enemy, and to do low strafing, which scared the Mohammedan soldiers to death, as they were convinced we were in league with the evil one. Other machines were used for bombing the forts held by the enemy, but great care was taken to spare


