Welcome back to home, friends and civil life. You bring with you laurels from the field, laurels in winning which you have endured hardships and our fallen heroes died.

We are justly proud of you. Come join us with all the vigour of your noble manhood in building a greater Canada than the one you helped to save.

An Open Letter
