NOW A MOSQUE AND HEADQUAR-TERS OF MOHAMMEDANISM.

Built Twelve Centuries Ago, It Was the Centre of Christianity Until the Crescent Supplanted the Cross.

A movement, begun recer/ly in London, to have the Peace Conference restore the Mosque of St. Sophia to Christendom "as the symbol of the redemption and liberation from agelong oppression of all those Christian peoples who are still left by the armistice under the reign of cruel fear and injustice," is fast gaining supporters.

The mosque, erected 326 years after the birth of Christ, served for nine centuries as the capital of the Christian world.
