Following is the address:

Yeovil, April 16, 1919
Clarence and John Ross,
Thos. McDougall:

Dear Boys,—
We are very glad and thankful to have the opportunity of welcoming you home. Since last we gathered to wish you goodbye and God-speed on your way you have had varied experiences—in the training camps—in the hospital—in the battle-field, face to face with death but you have brought safely through and permitted to once more see home and loved ones. We can imagine your feelings as you stood on the deck and watched Canada's shores coming into view—the thought of the poet, though perhaps unexpressed, was yours—"This is my own, my native land" and we are sure that "Your hearts within you warmly burned As home your willing footsteps turned. From wandering on a foreign strand."

And we at home are just as pleased to extend you the glad hand.

But our hearts are sad when we think of the boys who went with you but who will not return. Bravely they did their bit and their many friends shall not—not forget them. It is a great privilege to look forward to the day of the reunion in that land where there is no sorrow, war or death "and the sun it shall never go down."

We would not attempt to repay you for your sacrifice and bravery but as a slight token of our esteem and love we ask you each to accept the club bag and certificate. We hope you may never again have to carry the haversack or pack but that the club bag may fitly represent your peaceful pleasant mode of travelling and accompany you on many trips. As you look at the certificate, framed and hanging on the wall, let it remind you not only that you were partakers in the Great War for Right but also that all through life you are called to the high position of being faithful soldiers of the Cross under the Great Commander who has never been defeated and will always remain victorious.

Wishing you many happy years, we remain your friends.

One item of the program, was the reading by the Sec. of the following report:
The Yeovil Patriotic Society thought it would be suitable to give a short summary of the work we have done during the past three years and to show the boys, who have fought so well to defend our country, that we at home have tried to do our bit in making them comfortable and happy.

The Society was organized on Feb. 18, 1916, and has held regular meetings every month with an average attendance of eight.

We held several social gatherings at which the Society realized \$261.50. Several subscriptions were collected which amounted to \$54.05. We also depended upon the Council grants which came fairly regularly and we found them fairly acceptable, as being few in numbers we could not raise much money.

With this help the Society sent 28 bales to the Canadian Red Cross Soc. and 3 bales to the Belgium Relief.

To the Red Cross the following articles were sent: 307 prs. socks, 212 suits pyjamas, 53 boys shirts, 54 sheets, 109 pillow cases, 28 towels, 14 doz. handkerchiefs, 11 vermin shirts, 6 prs. wristlets.

To the Belgium Relief: 3 quilts, 50 yds material, 37 children's petticoats, 1 sheet 36 chemise, 6 women's petticoats, 44 pairs socks and stockings. Total value of all bales \$1085.30

Besides this, \$24.15 was collected to help send overseas boxes, 20 boxes containing cigs, socks and wristlets were sent.

We also donated to Mr and Mrs Bert Dyers 1 quilt and 3 bannette sheets.

This will give you a little idea what this Society and the older members of the vicinity have done to help make our soldiers comfortable.
