Son of Mr. and Mrs. Farquhar McKinnon, Priceville, killed in action Nov. 6th, 1917, aged 23 years. He enlisted in Melfert, Sask., Jan. 3, 1916 in the 188th batt.



Pte. Thos. Mather

(Sitting) younger son of Mrs J. Mather Priceville, killed in action, Oct. 26th, 1917, aged 20 years. Enlisted in Oct. 1915, with 147th battalion. Standing beside him is Pte. J. Weir, North Egremont, who has returned.



Pte. Robt. E. McLean

Son of Mr and Mrs D. G. McLean, Priceville, wounded Sept. 29th, 1918, and died of wounds the following day, aged 22 years. He enlisted in a Winnipeg battalion early in 1916.
