### Obituary

#### ALBERT HANN

It is with feelings of sorrow that we here express the deep sympathetic sentiments of the neighborhood, in the removal by death of this estimable young man on Saturday morning, the 17th inst. The fact that he was the only son of Mr and Mrs Aus tin Hann adds poignancy to the grief felt. He was born on the 16th of June 1895, thus making his age at time of death 23 yrs. 11 mos. and 1 day.

He had been ailing more or less since last fall, though able to be about until 2 or 3 weeks before his death. He bore his illness with Christian patience and resignation and had given expression of his faith in Christ to both Rev. Mr McCarten, his minister, and to the Rev. "The death took place on May 7th of an esteemed resident of this community, Mr Hugh Ball. His illness was brief, of heart trouble. He grew worse on Sunday and his condition became such that he passed away in three days.

The late Hugh Ball was born in County Fermanagh, Ireland over 87 years ago. He came to Canada and settled in Grey County in 1852. He was one of the pioneers of Normandy his farm being lot 20, con. 15. Over 60 years ago he married Mary Ann Smith, of Brant Township near Walkerton, who survives him at the age of 81, with seven sons and four daughters, (given last week.) A brother, John, well over 90 years of age lives at Holstein with his daughter, Mrs Chas. Drumm.

Deceased was a Methodist and a strong Conservative. He was for many years in Normandy Township Council as councillor and reeve. He was a great reader and a man of much intelligence and many good qualities.

The funeral took place Friday, pall bearers being four sons, son-in-law, Mr N Bigham and Mr S B McCready, postmaster, Harriaton.
