Had Germany won the war then we might have been able to estimate what we would have been willing to pay to save our country, our homes and our loved ones from such destruction and bloodshed as Belgium and other countries suffered. God has spared us from that and we thank him that this awful war is over and victory won. But we can never forget what we owe our brave army and navy. You were one among our boys who gave your service and offered your life if required to pay the price.

As a slight token of recognition of your noble service and with best wishes for your future success we would ask you to accept this gold signet ring and case of military brushes from us on behalf of the members of the Pentick Baptist church.
