Will Toronto Follow Winnipeg?

The serious condition in Winnipeg we referred to last week owing to the strike, is still serious. Only three of the metal trade bosses refuse to accede to the demands of the strikers, who are being strengthened by sympathetic strikes in Edmonton, Calgary and other places.

Metal trades in Toronto are making similar demands and were to strike on Tuesday, but 10 a. m. Friday is now fixed upon, unless Premier Borden, who, now in Ottawa, has been served with an ultimatum, promises legislation forthwith to make legal an eight hour day for the metal trades, and gives government sanction to "collective bargaining," which twenty Toronto bosses refuse to agree to.

The government was slow to act, and is receiving much criticism, but the Premier is thoroughly determined to maintain law and order, and has made plain that if post-office or other public utility employees go out in sympathy, they will stay out.

The man who advised that Toronto waterworks engineers should come out in support of the strike, cutting off the city water supply, is a criminal and should be arrested.
