**Death of Two Pioneers.**

**WILLIAM SMITH**  
On Friday last, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. (Rev.) Hamilton, Winterbourne, Wm. Smith, Sr., passed away at the ripe age of 87 years. For some years past his vitality was running low and his decease was not unlooked for, yet with his passing there is a pang to those who knew him, because a most worthy citizen is no more. The remains were brought to his old home, south line, Guelph, on Sunday morning, coming by a motor hearse, accompanied by his two sons-in-law, Rev. Mr. Hamilton, Winterbourne, the other also a Mr. Hamilton (though of different family) from Guelph.

The funeral took place same afternoon at Durham cemetery, where he was laid to rest by his wife, who predeceased him by nearly ten years. Rev. Mr. Hamilton read scripture and led in prayer, Rev. Mr. Whaley gave the discourse at once comforting and elevating.

Mr. Smith was born in England, coming to this country in youth, though he always retained a little of the English accent. His married life was a happy one and six sons and two daughters blessed the union. The sons are Wm. in Bennington, George near Mt. Forest, James a. Holstein, John in Regina and Bert and Charles on the old home. The daughters are at Guelph and Winterbourne, and much of his last years were spent under their loving care, occasionally enjoying also the homes of his sons.

Over 50 years ago he bought lot 23, con. 1, N. D. R. Guelph, which he sold some 38 years ago and bought the well-known home, close to Durham where he acquired a fair competence by industry and intelligent farming on the part of himself and his sons.

He was a most likable man, of strict integrity and had good business qualities. The writer was thrown much into his company for about ten years as Secretary of the Varney Cheese factory. There we learned to appreciate his character to the full and the memories of that association are still fondly cherished. He was Liberal in politics, and a devoted member of the Presbyterian church from whose services he was rarely absent while in health.
