Dear Friends,— Over a year ago, an article appeared in the Review telling of educational activities in the Canadian forces in England and France.

As near as I can learn Khaki College in England had a half-starved existence in 1918 and it was not until the armistice was signed that the scheme was organized on a proper basis and the wheels started to hum.

So the Canadians are leaving gold opinions behind them and to the shop-keepers, they are leaving plenty of remark that to us the English shop-keeper is a problem.

We haven't got away from our German friends yet. On the outskirts of the camp there is a prisoners of war cage containing a few thousand of our late enemies.

Before closing I will say a few words about Ripon itself. It is a city of 10000 inhabitants and its greatest claim to fame is its age and the Cathedral.

Like many other northern places Ripon suffered from the visits of the Danes and similar undesirable elements in his devastating raids in the north of England.

The present Cathedral was completed as it stands to-day only last century and is a very fine building. The people of this See are very proud of their principal place of worship.

The moors of Yorkshire are far famed, not alone for their great size but also for scenery. I have been unable to visit much of the country hereabouts but if the opportunity comes, I realize this is a treat in store for me.
