**The Budget—Not Satisfactory.**

Much interest is taken, and rightly so, in the budget brought down in parliament last week by Sir Thomas White. He had a heavy and onerous task on his hand and it goes without saying he has not pleased everybody. The Globe says: "The country asked a loaf and was given a soda biscuit."

Already one minister, Hon. Creer, Min. of Agriculture, has left the government as a protest against the inadequacy of the provision made to relieve the tariff burden of the farmers, and when the vote comes along, there is a likelihood of a slump of Western Union members which will leave the government with a slim majority, if these members vote with the opposition.

Reductions have been made on a few articles of luxury, and that there were not more is plainly traceable to the firm grip on the government, held by the manufacturers of the east. A war surtax on some few things has been thrown off, but even then the old duty is burdensome.

To make up for the reductions the government looks to the income tax, which is increased on the larger income and reaches down to lower incomes than formerly. There is still room for a greater pull in large incomes before we are measurably near to some other state, notably New Zealand which from a population of little over one million collects a much larger sum than Canada with its eight million population.

A serious lack in the budget is the omission of suitable provisions dealing with the industrial unrest at present rampant, and few indications that any of its provisions will help to reduce the high cost of living, the great desideratum at present among the laboring and industrial classes.

A mistake was made in making the Victory Loans non-taxable. Wealthy men have turned much of their means into this channel and can snap their fingers at the government and lift their 5 1/2 per cent with their tongue in their cheek. Wonder if there is no way to make these bonds taxable without raising "scrap of paper" cry?

**The Consequences of the War**

A summary of the peace to be imposed on Austria manifests more clearly than the German treaty the magnitude of the consequences of the war. The Austrian

Empire, successor of the Holy Roman Empire and of the Roman Empire, destroyer of Spain in the Middle Ages and arbiter of Europe under Charles Fifth, with sway over 50 millions of people, is required to acknowledge the independence of its Czech, Slav and Hungarian States, and dwindle to the Republic of Austria with a petty territory and a petty population of six millions, forbidden to unite with the Germans and bereft of the means of offence and defence. What madman with this lesson before him will hereafter provoke a world war?—Sun.
