DEATH OF WM. C. HUNT.

On Friday evening last at his residence here, William Carter Hunt passed away at the advanced age of 83 years after a month's illness. Deceased was born in 1836 in Summer, Wiltshire, Eng. and came to Canada with his parents at six years of age. They first located in the township of Vaughan, afterwards moved to Normanby and from there thirteen years ago they moved to Holstein where he has lived till the time of his death. In 1864 he married Mary Davis of Ayrton. To them were born five sons and four daughters all of which survive him but one son who died in childhood. The sons are Charles on the 12th con.; Geo. and Orme on the 2nd; and Rev. Wm. Hunt of Lions Head. The daughters are Mrs. (Rev.) Dixon of Roseburg, Oregon; Mrs. W. Collins of Toronto; Mrs. O. M. Seim, Bradford; and Mrs. Wm. Tyndall, Holstein. All the family were present at the time of his death but Mrs. Dixon. One brother, Mr. Geo. Hunt of Normanby survives him. Six years ago Mr. and Mrs. Hunt celebrated their golden wedding.
Deceased was a faithful member of the Methodist church and took an active part in all church work. He was a Conservative in politics and was a citizen loved and respected by all. The funeral was held Sunday afternoon to Mt. Forest cemetery, Rev. Mr. Lovegrove officiating. Pall bearers were his four sons and two sons-in-law, Wm. Tyndall and Wm. Collins. We extend sincere sympathy to the bereaved family and especially to his life partner who still survives him.
