Electrocution v. Hanging

Murderer McCullough was hanged last week, the law taking its course in spite of the clamor of a section of the public for a reprieve. We join our opinion with many others that legal death by hanging should cease entirely, and the modern method of electrocution be adopted. More-over in either system the gruesome details of the last moments should be rigidly suppressed. For her from the time the murderer is incarcerated, there should be a mantle of silence over his life and cell habits. The purpose of hanging criminals is intended to be a deterrent to others, but to minds of a certain type there is a kind of attraction in having dished up details of the prisoner's last days, which is an unhealthy influence. The gloom of silence, dead to the world, from the moment of condemnation, has more in it of terror than to know what the prisoner had for breakfast, or that he was giving good heed to his spiritual adviser!

Surely it was an indication of a degraded, morbid feeling, when 2000 people were told demonstrated for the last night before the cell windows cheering when the prisoner showed himself at the bars! Vera Layelle, who aided in his sensational escape, and was herself imprisoned and escaped, has been able so far to elude capture. Perhaps no great effort is being made to capture her! What good would it do now? Make her more of a heroine.

Wonders Never Cease

This old saw is getting exemplified these days in a wonderful way. Less than eighteen years ago a man went through the air in a machine heavier than air. Less than twelve years ago a Frenchman did the unheard of thing of crossing the English Channel, and the world wondered. Less than five years ago no aeroplane had been seen in war, but lo! it has become the eyes of an army, and it will avail the enemy nothing to skulk behind a hill! Even the submarine, itself a wonder, is not safe below the surface from the attacks of an enemy in the air!

But "peace hath her victories no less renowned than war," and since the war stopped the development of the airplane.

as to its wings or planes, its engines, its storage capacity and other features, has gone on with feverish haste. Men listened incredulously to boastings that the Atlantic would be bridged, the Americans did it on a three-legged journey, to the Azores, to Portugal, to Britain and for safety had a line of warships under them all the way.

Hawker and Grieve, Australians, won glory by attempting a direct flight and nearly did it and now comes the news that Capt. Alcock and Lieut. Brown, Englishmen both have flown from Newfoundland to Ireland direct, through heavy rainstorms and did it in 16 hours, 12 minutes!

Shades of our fathers! who took 6, 8, or 10 weeks to cross the "muckle dub," what would they say to this? Britain didn't know they had started till the islands rang with the news of their arrival. They win a purse of \$50000 and the plaudits of their admiring countrymen.

Dore unostentatiously, without protecting ships beneath, with gasoline to have gone 200 miles further, it is the greatest feat in aviation the world has yet seen. Wonders never cease and the struggle now will be to beat the time, to go further, but there's no \$50000 dangling ahead of them.
