Bentinck July 3, 1919. To Pte. Harvey Caswell:

Dear Friend,— We, your neighbors, friends and schoolmates, have much pleasure in extending you a hearty welcome on your return from the world's greatest conflict. While you were not fortunate to escape the German shells, we are pleased to see that your life has been spared and we further hope that you will soon be restored to your usual health and strength. Your courage has been amply manifested, in as much as you voluntarily offered your services three years ago, when a mere boy, at the age of seventeen.

At this time of your enlistment the horrors of war were well-known and you were cognizant that war and the conditions of "frightfulness and German treachery and deceptions" would be no picnic to those who entered the conflict. The only conclusion we can arrive at in your case is that your action was prompted by a spirit of the truest kind of loyalty and a desire to uphold the principles of democracy and the well being of the weaker nation.

We have every reason to rejoice at the manly spirit you have shown, and as a small token of our esteem, we present you with this purse and

club bag, believing in your good sense and judgment to use the contents in such a way as you see fit. We can never repay fully the true and noble sacrifice of such young men as you have proved yourself to be. You are a patriot and a hero, who, we trust, we shall ever have reason to respect.
