VEGETABLE MARKETING

High Prices Are Paid for Best Quality.
Provide Abundance of Cool Water for Dairy Cows During Hot Weather—Shade in Pasture Also Essential—Ideal Location on Banks of Cool, Pure Stream.

FEW growers realize the importance of properly harvesting and marketing their early vegetables. The large majority are expert enough to produce an excellent crop, but there is perhaps only about one out of ten that harvest and market their crop to the best advantage.
