### Peace Day Celebrations

Saturday last, "Peace Day" selected by King George for the empire, was much as other days in Durham, except that stores were closed, a few more flags flying than usual, and an exodus by car generally, to outside points where there was something to do.

In London, heart of the Empire, there was a celebration unequalled in its long history. A tremendous naval display was brought ashore from London as possible, the army of course could parade the streets, and did, the new defence feature, the air service, was well represented, and perhaps the most unique feature of the six mile parade was the presence of foreign generals, foreign troops, all in allied harmony.

### U. F. O. and Labor to Pull Together in North Grey

"The Provincial political situation is warming up," remarks the O. Sound Advertiser in the opening of an article giving an account of a preliminary meeting attended by representatives of the U. F. O. and Labor Unions of Owen Sound. The purpose of this meeting was to get together, to discuss public questions, and generally to find out on what points they agreed and on what they differed. "In general" says the article, "it was found that the platforms of the Labor party and the United Farmers are fairly well in accord, though differences exist notably in regard to the eight-hour day movement and the prohibition question—the farmers being opposed to the first, while on the prohibition question the U. F. O. favors the strictest measure possible to the Provincial government and the Labor interests go only so far as to agree to abide to the decision of the people as expressed in the referendum. The leaders in both organizations feel, however, that these points of difference can be arranged satisfactorily to both sides."

This feeling of harmony resulted in the calling of a convention on Aug. 2nd next, of the two bodies for the express purpose of putting a candidate in the field in North Grey. The convention will be open to all persons interested. Very great interest will be taken in this new departure. To help in the campaign it was decided to hold a monster Farmers' and Labor demonstration on Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 1.
