Quelph G. W. V. A. Upholds Sgt. Chas. McKinnon

Would you be kind enough to publish the following letter in the next issue of your valuable paper.

It has come to my attention that of recent date suspicious have been cast by the people of your district on the conduct of Chas. McKinnon and the attention of the public has been drawn through the medium of the press to his assumed connections with the recent incendiary fires in your district. This report has been circulated by a man who has no proof whatever for his statements.
 Mr McKinnon while on the witness stand in connection with the investigation gave such a straight forward account of himself and his actions on the date of the fire that the authorities of the Crown were forced to admit that he could have no connection whatever with the affair.
 Mr McKinnon enlisted in the 34th Batt early in 1915 and went overseas with the first draft of the war. He served for 23 mos. mid the danger, mud and shells of France and Belgium. Surely 23 mos. n these mad laden trenches is enough to make any community respect him.
 Mr. McKinnon is a member of the G. W. V. A. and the constitution of the G. W. V. A. states that only men of good character may be admitted to membership. Certainly if his character is good enough to admit him to membership of an Association comprised of men who have fought for their King and Country it should be good enough for the ones who stayed at home.

In Busy Belfast over the 'Glorious 12th'
 Chas. C. Ramage tells of Ulster's Capital in his concluding Overseas letter.

To us, Belfast was the favorite city in Ireland and we spent most of our time there. Belfast has about 375,000 population, has some remarkably fine buildings and an air of genuine progressiveness that reminded us of our Canadian cities. It is also one of the big industrial cities of the British Isles and we had the pleasure of seeing through the largest linen manufacturing mill in the world and the ship yard which built the Olympic and Titanic. In the great flax mill where there are 5000 women employees, we saw much child labor, notwithstanding the fact that there is a law against it. However working conditions seemed fairly good but wages were very low, about 15 shillings per week seemed the average wage for skilled hands. In the spinning room where intense heat is generated from the machines, all employees work without shoes. In the factory, we were shown the three grades of flax they were using, namely Flemish which is the best, Irish being second for quality and the Canadian product which is the coarsest and darkest of the three and used only for making coarser materials.
 The natives have a high idea of their fine industrial city and their pride is well illustrated by the following lines on one of their picture post cards:
 In building ships we go it passing strong;
 And we have rope works more than three miles long;
 Yarns by the yard, we spin without cessation
 And our colossal thread mills ticks creation
 The nets we make would hold, if sold retail,
 All the sea's fish, including Jonah's whale!
 We turn out so much whiskey, every minute,
 The British fleet could float quite easy in it!
 And, with tobacco, we could (without joking)
 Set all the chimneys in the kingdom smoking!
 Our staple trade, of bleachin', dyein', spinnin',
 Would clothe the world in purple and fine linen.

Struck it Rich

"Dave" McKenzie is always turning something up. To be more respectful we allude to Dr. D. McKenzie, Mayor of Fort Frances, an old upper town boy. For 15 years, we learn from a recent issue of the Fort Frances Times, he and one Thos. Rawn have been quietly conducting research work and have made a great discovery of rich ore. Here is an extract:
 "This spring they were again at it with a diamond drill, and at last their reward is in sight. In plain words—they have struck it—the drill is in the ore at 185 ft. It is a soft very high grade red hematite, and there appears to be no doubt of the large extent of the deposit. The importance of this discovery for this District can scarcely be overestimated and that importance is nation wide.
 This is the only body of high grade hematite as yet laid bare in Canada and it means a tremendous thing to the manufacture in Canada of all iron products.
 Too much credit cannot be given to Dr McKenzie and Mr. Rawn. They deserve the fortune which no doubt will reward their efforts and they have the satisfaction of knowing that in benefiting themselves they have also benefited their district and their country to an inestimable extent. Soon Ft Frances will feel the benefit of the great mining industry about to spring up at her very door and the heretofore unproductive portion of our district will be our richest section."

 We sailed from Belfast that same evening and landed in Fleetwood the following morning. Our ten days' leave was scarcely sufficient to get a real glimpse of Irish life but we learned to know that wherever we went in Ireland, south or north, Canadian soldiers were welcomed and were kindly treated from the bottom of their Celtic hearts. Owing to the unsettled condition of Ireland, I am sure many of the younger generation will soon leave the old sod, and go to America. At least many spoke in that vein.
 And now at the close of almost four years of soldiering, the writer wishes to convey his appreciation to Review readers who have so kindly commented on his letters written while at the front and in England. If sometimes the reader got an extra whiff of the conditions of a soldier's life, we are gratified. It was a broadening experience for all participants albeit it was acquired at a fearful and pitiful cost. Blighted Belgium and war-torn France will regain their beauty and their prestige, harassed Britain can still hold her head proudly for the part she has taken and our own Canada has had cast around her a mantle of glory which we hope the future will never see tarnished.
