**Calls for Explanation**

Mr. A. De Witt Foster, who was elected M. P. for King's, N. S., in 1911, defeating Sir Frederik Borden resigned on April 24th, 1915, in consequence of an investigation into the purchasing of horses for the war. He has not been much in the public eye since that time, but has been located by Mr. J. J. Morrison, Secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario. At a convention of that organization in Shelburne Mr. Morrison said: "Let me tell you where Mr. De Witt Foster actually is now. I have located him from an advertisement appearing in 'The Country Gentleman.' Is it not surprising that these advertisements do not appear in the press of this country? The advertisement reads: 'De Witt Foster, Superintendent of Resources Canadian National Railway, Dept. 8 645, Marquette Building, Chicago, Ill.'"—Globe.

**Veterans will help Prohibition**

"A Man's Job as War was."

So asserts Dr. Andrew Grant, Secretary of the Ontario Referendum Committee, speaking in Toronto. He says: "they are no longer soldiers, but citizens, and many of them come back with stronger convictions than they had before they went away. I am afraid of the slacker electors on this election, just as the country was afraid of the slackers during the war."

If, he said, we needed this measure (The Ontario Temperance Act) in order to make our contribution to the war, we need it just as much after the war because of:

- 1—Our accumulated debt.
- 2—Our tremendous loss of man power.
- 3—Our responsibility in administering to those who have served.

There is in the coming vote the greatest challenge that ever was given to any young country to pay on the mantle of its nationhood, to rise to the occasion as we did in the war. To-day the challenge comes to us as a people, whether or not we are going to be the promoters of the liquor business, for that is virtually what it means if we go back on prohibition.

"Some say the women will decide this issue" continued the speaker. This is a man's job and it is just as much a man's job as the war was. We could not have won without it.

women, but the great amount of active fighting had to be done by the men, and that is true of this great moral and religious issue. If the men of our Province don't think it worth while to get up and relate themselves to this task, they are going to suffer, materially, industrially and politically." The women are welcome, we want them, but both women and men are wanted to bury deeply down the liquor traffic for beverage purposes.

Dr. Grant cautioned the electors against the cry that workmen would be robbed of their beer by voting "no" on all questions. "Under the Ontario Temperance Act we are leaving to the workmen beer which is three times stronger than the beer which is to be legally sold in the United States." No person who indulges in alcohol for beverage purposes, can remain 100 per cent efficient.
