BRUCE FARMERS ARE PROSPEROUS.

The farmers of Ontario are to-day enjoying a period of unexampled prosperity. Some idea of this may be gleaned from the fact that a traveller for a law office supplies, on a trip up through Bruce county and adjacent counties two weeks ago sold 1,700 Discharge of Mortgage forms in one week which is as much as is usually sold by him in this particular territory in four years.—Post.

The returned man is entitled to the best to be had and it is gratifying to know that the Northern Business College which is the only Ontario School under a Chartered Accountant Mr C. A. Fleming, F. C. A., has been secured for the re-training of soldiers.

Major G. D. Fleming, who rejoins the staff for the fall term, went overseas as second in command of an infantry battalion, reverted to Lieut. to get to France and won his promotion to Major again in the field, and is the only Canadian Business School owner who fought in France.

Altogether it is the ideal school for returned men and every man who enlisted under age or who through wounds or sickness on active service, cannot resume his previous occupation is entitled to free tuition at the Northern Business College and a liberal living allowance while attending. Returned men eligible for a course should correspond with the College.
