The Case of General Currie

There would appear to be some difference in the estimate placed on the services of Gen. Currie by the Ottawa Government and the estimate of those services by the soldiers who served under the General in the field. The Ottawa Government, in recognition of the record made by Gen. Currie in Europe, has made him Commander-in-Chief of Canada's military forces at home. At the same time a Toronto journal states that when the question of welcoming the General on his arrival at Halifax came before the branch of the G. W. V. A. in that city the vote of the veterans was strongly against giving such welcome. Another report in the Toronto journal, containing interviews with veterans in this city, indicates that there is a like indisposition among Toronto's returned soldiers to tender a formal welcome to their late commander.

The situation is a curious one to say the least and would seem to call for some further explanation.—Sun.

A Royal Progress

Edward Albert Patrick David &c., Prince of Wales, eldest son of our gracious Sovereign, is having a triumphant progress through Canada at present. At St. John, New Brunswick, Halifax, Nova Scotia, and in Prince Edward Island, great demonstrations greeted him. He then passed through the romantic St. Lawrence gulf and river to old Quebec, where still greater and more historical ground was viewed. Placing wreaths on the monuments to Wolfe and Montcalm, replying in French to an address in French, were the first things that fairly won the French heart. Everywhere he is winning golden opinions, he makes the most of his war comradeship with Canadians, and several times has stated that he wants Canadians to look upon him as one of themselves, and altogether is comporting himself with a simplicity and dignity that is winning all hearts. He is in Toronto this week, officially opening and taking in the big Show, and will be duly impressed with its magnitude no doubt.
When he has danced in all the capitals partaken of scores of banquets, viewed the prairies, the mountains and the Pacific coast, listened to a number of addresses, passed under hundreds of arches, been welcomed by Uncle Sam at the close of his Canadian tour, he will have a greater

experience than had his father and grandfather on their tour, the latter 59 years ago, though he will be a pretty tired boy.
"God bless the Prince of Wales," he is strengthening the links of empire by this memorable tour.

Bye-Elections

No fewer than eight bye-elections will be held 27th October. The seats are: one in P. I. Island, Quebec East (Laurier's old seat.) Kingston (Nickie resigned.) Glengarry and Stormont, N. Ontario, Assiniboia, Carleton, N. B., (Carvell's seat, now appointed to the Railway Com.) and Victoria, B. C.
It is expected that only Victoria will be unopposed. Farmer's Candidates are already nominated in two constituencies and more is expected. The government is being criticized for delaying them so long as the fall session will be over before Leader McKenzie King can take his seat.
