AN OWEN SOUND BAD DRUM—Fortunately no person in this locality had heard of the following wild rumor appearing in last week's Owen Sound Sun-Times: "A story was broadcast throughout the town yesterday and this morning to the effect that a double murder had been committed at a threshing near Durham.

It is said that two men were working side by side one feeding the threshing machine and the other cutting the bands.
