Get Down to the Roots of It

Among the reforms that might fairly be advocated in this country is the abandonment by both the Federal and Provincial Governments of the practice of preparing special voters' lists for general elections. The work is done at very great expense. It is done in a hurry. It is done by special enumerators who are not just and impartial, but who are selected because they are relatives of the party which appoints them. No doubt many of them are men of excellent character who do their work conscientiously, etc., etc. But still, the plan works out in such a way that the political party which prepares the lists does not get the worst of it. The people of a community should resent this invasion of their rights by a political party, either Federal or Provincial, which happens to be in office. A community, whether it be a town or a township, prepares a list of its own in any event, and until quite recently this was used as the basis for all voting. The municipality knows its own people best, it is listing them annually, assessing and taxing them; its lists are prepared at leisure, printed, circulated, seen by everybody. The municipality, moreover, has the right of representation, which it should not be willing to see encroached upon by any political organization. First there was a Federal enumeration; now there is a Provincial one. The municipalities everywhere should resent it, because of the waste it involves, and because there exist in it possibilities of rascality. The municipal lists, if not sufficiently up to date could be supplemented by registrations made before the county judges sitting publicly for the purpose. Some of

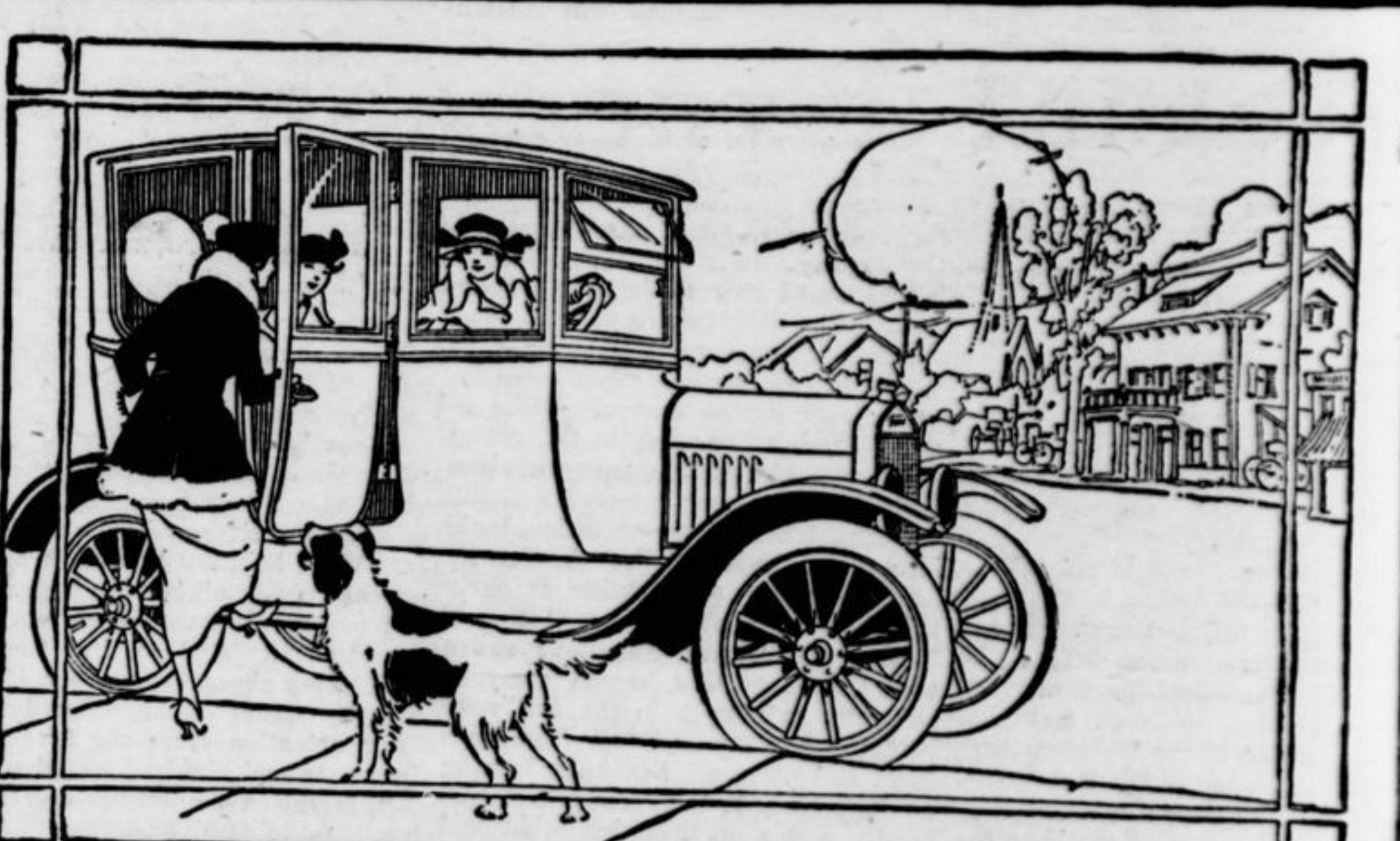
