She will be especially missed by Jennie, who has spent the past eighteen years in faithfully assisting in taking care of her parents in their declining years.

Such courage and loyalty, one of the first to go forth, one of the last to come back you will surely have your reward. We ask you to accept this gift, not for its value—we feel we can never repay you for what you have done—but as a little token of thankfulness from your old friends and neighbors.
