**Save Clover Seed**

Indications are that Red Clover seed is going to be scarce and expensive, and under the circumstances, it will be good business for anyone who has a clover field which may yield a seed crop this fall to cut it for the sake of the seed. The applies especially to fields in which at this time of the year a large percentage of the heads have turned brown. If in doubt as to whether such a field will be worth while cutting for seed, take some average heads which are brown right through and rub them, when perfectly dry, in the palm of your hand, and you may be surprised at the quantity of good seed that may shell out.

If you are not sure whether it will pay to go to the trouble of harvesting the crop for seed, send a sample for examination to either of the undersigned. No stamps needed for samples weighing less than 12 ounces. Other information on harvesting, threshing, etc., will also be supplied promptly.

**The "Indemnity Session"**

There are mutterings many and great because some returned soldiers are asking the country to give them \$2000 each, but such doings as are going on at Ottawa for the last three weeks give point to their demands.

A special session of parliament was called to get Canada's official consent to the Peace Treaty. This has been done in a few days. Other matters of public business were not important and could have waited, but then parliament would have adjourned in less than 30 days, and members would have been paid only \$20 per day.

By spinning the session out to the 31 days, the members get the full indemnity of \$2500 00 each. Week before last they sat for only 10 hours; ten hours in a week; and the Senate will adjourn at seven o'clock, and be it remembered this precious Senate gets their \$2500 each as well as the Commons.

This session has been dubbed the "Indemnity Sesson" in fine sarcasm, but is it any wonder in view of this wanton waste of public money that soldiers think some of it should come their way?

Thrift, economy, production, are preached to the people, but our parliamentary rulers—ourselves—seem to consider themselves above such injunctions.

Is it any wonder that an impetus is given to the formation of such bodies as the United Farmers of Ontario?

**A Blow to Hearst Government**

Political sensations are becoming common. Last Saturday, Col. Pratt, M. P. P., a member of the Hearst government, kicked over the traces at a Convention at St. Williams, S. Northwick. It was a Conservative Convention and unanimously threw Pratt out and put John S. Martin of Port Dover in.

Col. Pratt asked for and was given permission to address the Convention. His charges were that the Ontario government had allowed nickel to reach Germany. Five times after German bombardments he had picked up steel-nosed bullets, which he believed were made from Canadian nickel: another charge was that they were exploiting the water-powers of the province in the interests of a certain class. He objected to the time and the way that had given the Opposition leader \$5000 more than hinting it was to buy his consent to prolong parliament, and said that 27 Conservative members were opposed to Premier Hearst.

All this in the presence of Hon. Mr. Lucas and other stalwarts. Mr. Lucas dared him to name the 27, denied that Ontario nickel reached Germany or that water-powers were handled wrongly, and scorned the imputation that they had tried to bribe Mr. Proudfoot. "Do you people believe," said Mr. Lucas, "that the Ontario government, every member of which who had a son, had him overseas, were likely to allow nickel to leave Canada to shoot our Canadian boys?"

Col. Pratt will run as independent at the coming election.

Samuel Gompers, the world's greatest labor leader, stated the workmen's position clearly when he said:

"The normal man, the men of Labor who work eight hours a day and no more, the workmen who earn decent pay, the workmen who have comparatively comfortable homes, they do not want the artificial spirit. The man of normal spirit finds comfort in pleasant surroundings; he does not need, and, as a rule, does not partake of intoxicating drinks; he shuns the effects of intoxicants. What we now ask is that the men of Labor, the masses of our people, shall have the opportunity to drink a glass of beer of not more than 2 1/2% by weight of alcohol in that beer, and I am told you cannot drink enough of that character of beer to get drunk even if you tried."

Scientific tests, practical experiments and thorough research prove that beer of even greater strength than 2.51% of alcohol by weight, is absolutely non-intoxicating. (The results of these tests have been filed with the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.)
