A Teachers' Convention is a stirring event in the average teachers' life, and is of no small interest to the community.

He emphasized strongly the need of teachers not only knowing their subject but of knowing more about it than they are required to teach. He advised cultivating the gift of lucid impartation so as to think and teach clearly.

appointment as President and a delightful reminiscence address, came Prof. Cornish of the Faculty of Education, on Nature Study. Later he spoke on 'The Old Geography and the New' and the second day on 'Maps and how to use them.'

Dr. E. R. Gray and Nurse Jamieson of Toronto had just completed a medical and dental survey of High and Public Schools. They addressed the Convention advocating that Durham in conjunction with Hanover, should consider the appointment of a permanent nurse.

A well-prepared and well-presented paper on 'English in the Public School' was given by Mrs. Horne, B. A., of the High School staff. The summer course in Agriculture at the O. E. A. was discussed by Messrs W. J. Lippert and H. W. Ermed, both of Neustadt, who have attended the sessions. Misses Edith Edge and Eliz. McCuaig were also enthusiasts on the course, the former advocating School Fairs as a means of creating greater love for farm work.

FRIDAY
After devotional exercises Miss Julia Weir, B. A. spoke on 'Art' and she made the subject interesting by exhibiting pictures to illustrate her remarks.

Mr. J. A. Hamilton, Principal of Durham High School spoke on 'The Education of Tomorrow.' Beginning with the 'Great Teacher—our example—he traced systems through the ages until the times of the early settlers in the bush and up to our own day.

The Union Movement among teachers was taken by Mr. E. A. Rutledge of Dundalk and aroused uncommon interest. The teachers seemed to be in thorough sympathy with the idea of organization and a committee was appointed to deal with the matter further.

An unexpected pleasure was in store for the teachers; no less than an address from Hon. Dr. Cody, Min. of Education, who was that day on the war path with Dr. Jamieson. We believe it is a genuine pleasure also for Dr. Cody to meet a bunch of teachers and the brilliant half hour address he gave was a gem in its way.

Views of thanks to President, High School Board, people of Durham for hospitality, and to all who had helped were duly passed.

WAR WORK
Ontario gave in men 232,695; in contributions \$24,322,183; in Victory loans \$240,463,350. Ontario provided 59 per cent of Canada's war effort.

EDUCATION
Ontario's educational system is designed to provide the most efficient training possible for the boys and girls who are to become the future citizens of the state.

HYDRO-ELECTRIC
Hydro is today the most extensive public ownership enterprise of its kind in the world. Since its inception Hydro-Electric has saved to the consumers of electric power in Ontario over fifty millions of dollars.

AGRICULTURE
