Election Notes

—Dr. Jamieson in his career of 22 yrs reached the position of Speaker, entitling him to the honor of "first citizen of the province." No defeat can detract from this record.

—Monday's Globe had Jamieson elected by 900, which caused "anxious enquirers" some perturbation. This was the first despatch sent when only the town results were known. Leeson's majority is 459, with 9 polls to hear from which may bring it up to 600 or more.

—Five of Toronto's 8 seats have elected Liberals and by big majorities. This is both a revelation and a revolution in "Tory Toronto," and they weren't farmers either these voters.

—The two lady candidates, Mrs Bundy, Toronto, and one in Ottawa were defeated, though Mrs Bundy was second of four candidates.

—We are delighted with the result," said Mr J. J. Morrison, Secretary, Treasurer of the United Farmers' Co-operative Company, Limited, who has worked hard in the political campaign for the U. F. O. "It is about what we expected. I have nothing more to say than that. We will have to consider the situation before expressing opinions on the general result."

—With Toronto even and the Province two to one, the country is safe," said Ben, H. Spence referring to the Prohibition vote.

which is much better than was expected. The small minority on Question 4 will easily be offset by the province. It is expected the majority on Question 1, will be over 300,000 in the Province.

—The vote of the women was most creditable, though at least one woman in town voted four 'yes'es.

—Labor is said to have 11 members elected. There is a sinister foreboding in the increase of Labor representatives, it being just possible a foreign non-progressive vote is behind them especially in the large cities.

—Major Tolmie, who was second in the vote for Liberal leadership, has a majority of 4000. Dewar, the leader has 5500.

—MacKenzie King, Leader of the Opposition at Ottawa, was elected by acclamation for the county of Prince,

P. E. I. on Monday last, and will take his place at Ottawa a few days before the session closes. Sir Henry Drayton, the new Min. of Finance was also elected by acclamation in Kingston same day.

—Next Monday six by-elections for vacancies in the Ottawa parliament take place. The places are Quebec East (Laurier's old seat), Victoria, B. C., North Ontario (with Halbert, V. F. O. leader, one of the candidates.) Stormont-Glenagarry, Assinibois, Sask. Carleton, N. B.
