Unveiling at Allan's School

An interesting function took place on Tuesday evening in Allan's school Egremont, when there was a dual unveiling, that of the honor roll containing the names of seven young men of the district who had enlisted, and that of the pictures of the two who had made the supreme sacrifice, Lieut. Thos. Allan and Cecil Davis. Two other pictures of boys who had seen active service at the front, since returned, also adorn the walls, those of Jas. Barbour and John Davis. To Mrs P. Lawrence, Durham, was given the honor of unveiling the roll, while Rev's Smith of Dromore and Hardy unveiled the pictures. An "In Memoriam" expression of sympathy from Egremont Council was presented to Mr W. J. Davis, father, and Mr Wm. Allan, brother, of the fallen boys. Along with the unveiling ceremonies, a fine program of addresses and music was rendered, Mr W. Irwin being in the chair. Messrs J. H. Harding and A. Bell of Durham contributed 'o's, Messrs Jas. Watson, Arch McDonald and Douglas Donnelly of Knos, Normandy, trios, and Mr Thos. Allan, Durham, Rev's Hardy and Smith gave brief addresses. No. 2 section is among the first we have learned of holding such an event, and in so doing the district has honored itself by thus paying tribute to the departed heroes, and those again home.

ALLAN'S CORNERS

The memorial service which was held in Allan's schoolhouse turned out successful. Editor Irwin being chairman. The unveiling of the fallen heroes, i. e. Thos.
