The Ballot Box Works Wonders

The ballot box is a marvelous machine and it turns out some wonderful work. Now and then it produces some strange pieces that do not fit very well in any large and beneficent scheme but on the whole the ballot box does things and solves problems that the genius of our wisest men could not disclose of.

It was not foreseen that the Farmer-Labor parties would carry the Provincial elections. They did not expect any such success. The men they hoped for was that they would elect groups to sit in opposition to whatever Government held office, and criticize and denounce the actions of others.

Instead of that they have now complete control of affairs. The farmer in the country, the labor men from the cities and towns, will administer the affairs of Government. There is so much discontent and unrest abroad in town and country that it must be deemed fortunate that the Province has escaped, during the next four years, the agitations and provocations to discontent that would have arisen from strong Farmer and Labor groups sitting as minorities in the Legislature and indulging in bitter reproaches against conditions they were powerless to deal with.

Instead of that the situation is theirs to control. They are free to introduce such reforms and betterments as their own leaders may find themselves able to bring into effect. It follows that the farmers throughout the country, the workers in the industrial centres, now having in the control of affairs men of their own sympathetic with them and their aspirations, will necessarily adopt a changed attitude and instead of railing against every body and everything will at once become more hopeful and reasonable, and admit that this is not, perhaps such a bad old world after all. It means a changed and improved state of the popular mind.—Tor. S. ar.

King Coal Very Restless
