**The Warden's Address**

Warden McQuaker, of Owen Sound made a model address to Co. Council last week. After greeting and thanks to Providence for a beautiful year he said: "We have been reminded since our June Session once again of the fleeting character of life—the grim reaper has called away one of our members in the person of Mr. Geo. Lothian, Reeve of Egrement, one who as a member of this council while not taking a very prominent part in the proceedings, was recognized by us all as a man of sincerity, honesty of purpose and beautiful character."

Mr. McArthur returns to us to complete the term of Mr. Lothian and I suggest that at the first session you arrange to have Mr. McArthur placed upon the committees of which Mr. Lothian was a member.

He referred to the wonderful success of Grey in the Victory Loan. They were asked for \$2,650,000 and secured \$4,371,800. He had got as Warden the Prince of Wales' flag, and he placed it at the disposal of the Council.

Among the matters to which he asked their earnest attention were: the construction and maintenance of Co. Roads; as pedlars were now using motor-driven vehicles, he suggested amending the by-law governing them and increasing the license; asked for a by-law to regulate Tax sales and thought there was room for sensible amendments in the regulations.

Communications would be placed before them looking to the formation of a mounted constabulary for the County.

The question of the degrading of Chatsworth High School to a Continuation school or even of abolishing it altogether was another vexed question to come before them.

His closing paragraphs were: "May I be permitted to impress upon you, gentlemen, the pleasure it has been to me during the summer to meet with many of you in your own municipalities and to recognize the respect and esteem in which you are there held, and with you share in many of the receptions which have been tendered to our returned men. You have all been exceedingly good and kind to me and I thoroughly appreciate the honor which you have extended to me in all my work."

In conclusion permit me to express the hope that the present may be a harmonious and profitable session in the consideration and disposal of the various items of business and legislation which will be brought before you. I am sincerely yours,
