Mission Work in Korea

These interested in Foreign Missionary work had a treat on Sunday in listening at two services while Mrs. H. McKenzie graphically portrayed Missionary work and conditions. Mrs. McKenzie is chief Secretary of the Presbyterian Church for the Korean Mission Field and is the headquarters in Canada for all information relating to the wonderful gospel work done in the once called "hermit kingdom."

She is a ready talker and tells an interesting story. She gave in outline the political history of this nation of 12 million people. It is painful to hear her tell of the treatment given the nation by Japan since the latter conquered Korea. It can only be compared with German treatment of Belgium and one is exasperated to think that one of the allies, who helped to put down German arrogance, should show the same traits.

Of all the Mission Fields none show greater progress in imbibing gospel truth than Korea. The Jesus story has appealed to them with remarkable force and of them it may be said "a nation was born in a day." The speaker gave many incidents to show the devotion of this Christianized people to their new faith and to the bible (turning an example that might well be emulated in our own land, even with all our supposed advantages).

Such talks as Mrs. McKenzie gives should prove a great stimulus to the great "Forward Movement."

Durham Nurses Graduation

A Brilliant Affair

The annual graduation exercises of the nurses of Stratford General Hospital last Monday, was an event of outstanding interest to the citizens of that city. Of the six graduates, two were from Durham, Misses M. Young and Margaret Derby. Prominent men of the city presented each with their diploma and accompanied it with a brief address. As each nurse received her diploma, numerous bouquet of flowers were presented to them. The Beacon, says: "Long before the hour of commencement the Majestic theatre was filled and those who failed to gain admittance were keenly disappointed. The platform never before looked prettier than it did last evening. The whole place seemed to have been transformed into one beautiful garden of flowers. The front of the stage was banked with ferns, plants, flowers. Colored lights adorned the foot lights and made a very pretty effect. The stage was hung with many varieties of colored Chinese lanterns, flags and bunting.

Occupying the first two rows on the stage were the white gowned, white capped graduates, nurses in training, together with Miss Munn, the superintendent of the Hospital, Miss Abel, her assistant, and Miss Weshol, the dietitian."

The New Speaker

Premier Drury has announced that he will recommend as Speaker of the Ontario Legislature Nelson Parliament, M. L. A. for Prince Edward County, who was elected as a Liberal with strong U. F. O. backing. The selection by the Premier of a Speaker is not final, as the private members of the Legislature will have a vote on the question at the first session of the new Legislature. The Premier's choice is no surprise, and it was generally anticipated.

Mr. Parliament has assured the Premier that he will accept the Speakership if his constituents endorse his acceptance. He will call a meeting in his riding at an early day and place the matter before them.

The standing of the members in the House since the last election is: U. F. O., 45; Labor 11. The coalition thus has a total following of 56, a majority of one. Mr. Parliament's acceptance of the Speakership gives the Government a majority of two as it decreases the Liberal following by one.

Mr. Parliament has been a member of the Legislature since 1914. Before the U. F. O. movement assumed political importance, Mr. Parliament was a member of the organization in his riding.

Mr. Parliament is forty-two years old, having been born at Ameliasburg where he still lives. He is of United Empire Loyalist stock, and was educated at Belleville. He was married in 1899.

Royal Bank Foreign Trade Department

A Step in Advance

The Royal Bank of Canada announces the establishment of a Foreign Trade Department at head office to handle commercial enquiries and to cater to the growing interest shown in export trade by Canadian business men. This new department is to be in charge of Mr. L. D. Wilgress, who for some years has been connected with the Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa and who, during the past three years, has been in the capacity of Canadian Trade Commissioner, being stationed first at Omsk and afterwards at Vladivostok. The establishment of such a department has been rendered necessary by the rapid extension of the foreign connections of the Royal Bank of Canada. This institution has now 76 offices in foreign countries, in addition to 344 branches in Canada and Newfoundland. The recent opening of branches in the leading trade centres of South America gives the Royal Bank of Canada a complete chain of branches throughout the West Indies, Central and South America and offices in the important financial centres of London, New York, Paris and Barcelona, Spain.

With such extensive connections the Royal Bank of Canada is in a position to offer exceptional facilities to traders with foreign countries. Every mail brings an increasingly large number of inquiries from foreign firms desirous of establishing connections with Canadian houses for the import or export of merchandise. These inquiries will in future be handled by the newly established foreign trade department. Information regarding trade conditions in foreign countries, markets for Canadian goods, current prices in export markets and particulars as to the credit and standing of foreign firms will be systematically collected and kept on file for the use of Canadian firms. Publications will be issued from time to time on subjects connected with the development of Canadian trade.

In a manifesto issued last week he finds fault with what he alleges are attempts to reduce Liberals to join U. F. O. ranks. He is careful not to blame Mr. Drury, in fact he hardly blames anyone, but says Mr. Drury is "conniving" for this purpose. Mr. Dewart is clever but under the circumstances he would have been better advised to refrain from suspicious utterances till more was revealed to justify suspicion.
